



































The Missing Concrete

- 62,000 tons of concrete "Missing"
- Contractor B responsible for buying concrete to make up the difference
- Contractor B refuses to pay Contractor A
- Suit, Countersuit for damages



- This entire case was about documentation
 - What it meant
 - How it was construed
 - What was missing



Documentation

- Haul Tickets
- Letters/memos/emails documenting critical events
- Meeting Minutes
- Photos/Videos



Emails

- Is a phone call more appropriate?
- Email "Can we meet?" with no follow up
- Emails with missing attachments and threads







Minutes

- Meeting Minutes
- A documentation of an earlier call or meeting? Don't be lazy and cut the concepts short.





Minutes

- Meetings no documentation
- Missing attachments
- Incomplete thoughts shortcuts





Minutes

- Attendees Roles and responsibilities
- In depth descriptions missing
- Very High level minutes





Truck Haul Tickets

- The process was based on "trust"
- Inadequate records
- No monitoring
- "Tickets" produced days or weeks later

"A" versus "The"


Were there options?







- The words "a" and "the" mean two very different things when referring to objects.
- "The car drove silently down the road because it is electric."
- In this sentence "the car" refers to a specific car.
 There is one specific car that is electric and that drove silently down the road.





- The words "a" and "the" mean two very different things when referring to objects.
- "A car drove loudly down the road because it had a large gasoline engine."

In this sentence "a car" means any car. A non-specific car drove loudly down the road.

- How you arrived at conclusions




Scraps of Paper

What do they mean?


Example; Bid noting risk of a specific statement

Documentation; spreadsheets, analysis, etc

- Who created
- What data used/source
- Date created





Closing Thoughts

- Documentation of critical processes was inadequate and based on everyone doing the "right thing"
- Emails with missing information
- Minutes of meetings did not adequately define what was discussed
- Language in emails was dissected words are important
- DETAILS MATTER
